The Trust acquired the old 3rd bell when it was replaced by a newly cast bell in 2011. The bell was installed at Little Bedwyn, Wiltshire during May 2014 as part of the restoration scheme and is the treble of the ring of five. During 2014 the Trust acquired a bell ex-Holy Trinity, Bury which has replaced the 6th bell of the ring of eight at Allesley.

The existing ring of steel bells has been replaced with a bronze ring incorporating three tenor bells from the redundant St George's North church, Greenock. This formed the basis of a ring of ten bells with a tenor weight of 18-0-9.



The photograph was taken on 30th September 2012 at Taylor's Bellfoundry and show the ring of ten bells prior to installation. The three ex-Greenock bells are the three largest bells to the RHS of the picture.
